Three Ways to Bias-Proof Text Selection

In auditing individual texts, consider...

- 1. What types of whole-class texts are written by authors of color?
- 2. Do the characters perpetuate any negative stereotypes?
- 3. Do the characters have agency as they face hardships? Is joy represented?
- 4. Are female and LGBTQ+ authors represented equally?
- 5. Whose experiences are centered in the text?
- 6. Is your use of the text abiding by fair-use guidelines?



In auditing text groups, consider...

- Which texts are taught whole-class vs. as small groups or literature circles?
- 2. Are authors of color only featured in units about race, justice, or trauma?
- 3. Are there multiple authors represented from any demographic to demonstrate a group's diversity?
- 4. Do the texts work together to build the background knowledge that will include all students in the learning?



In auditing how texts are broken up, consider...

- 1. Is the chunk being read today a reasonable length given its complexities so that all students can be included in the learning?
- 2. If it's a longer work, like a novel, what's the plan to include students who are absent or don't read it?
